1500-1520 and Our Lutheran Heritage

During the first twenty years of the 16th century, the world was being reshaped in many venues. The High Renaissance was in full swing. Da Vinci painted the Mona Lisa. Michelangelo sculpted his statue of David, and then for four years painted the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel. Work was begun on St. Peter's Cathedral in Rome. Botticelli and Raphael were at the height of their careers. The Portuguese established colonies and trade centers in Brazil, India, Indonesia, and China. In China, it was the middle period of the Ming dynasty. The reign of Ivan the Great was drawing to a close in Russia. The Ottoman Turks extended their empire into Syria, Palestine, Iran, Egypt, and Arabia. At the end of this period, one of the greatest Ottoman emperors, Suleiman the Magnificent, began his forty-six-year reign. In the Western Hemisphere, Cortez completed his conquest of the Aztecs. The Inga empire was at its height in the Andes. Ponce De Leon claimed Florida for Spain. Cabot discovered Hudson Bay. The first Africa slaves were brought in. Balboa was the first European to sail into the Pacific Ocean. Magellan set up to sail around the world. Meanwhile, in England Henry VIII began his reign.

In the midst of all of these events, a little-known German priest and professor began to question some of the practices of the Roman Catholic Church. Though unnoticed by the greater world, on October 31, 1517 Martin Luther nailed 95 theses for debate on the Church Castle door in Wittenberg. This is the date traditionally marked as the beginning of the Protestant Reformation which reshaped much of the world by the end of the 16th century.

For four Sundays in October (October 3, 10, 17, 24) we are going to rediscover our Lutheran Heritage in a class taught by Pastor Rick in Centennial all beginning at 9:50 a.m. We will examine the foundational events of the Reformation, the theological developments of Martin Luther, some of the core documents of Lutheranism, and then we will trace the spread of Lutheranism in the United States from the 1600s to today. In this way we will rediscover our central believes as Lutherans and how we got to where we are now as a Lutheran church (or as Lutheran churches). Coffee and donuts will be available so this October you are invited to come and rediscover our Lutheran heritage. 

September 16, 2021

To the members of First Lutheran:

We want to give you an update on some recent church council decisions. COVID is still a very real thing and has recently been gaining momentum in our area. According to the Two Rivers Health Department, there has been nearly a 30% increase in cases per week since early August. While the Two Rivers dial is currently at the elevated level, it is almost at the pandemic range. Some of our church leaders recently visited with a doctor from Kearney Regional Hospital. Our leaders were informed by this doctor that our local hospitals are nearly full and our healthcare providers are being pushed to the limit. With this information in mind, the First Lutheran Congregation Council has decided to modify some of the procedures at First Lutheran.

The following changes will be taking place: 1) We will be spraying down the pews after each service. 2) The children will not be asked to come forward for the children's sermon. Noisy Offering buckets can be found alongside the collection plates at the sanctuary entrances. 3) The following positions will be wearing masks: worship leaders, assisting ministers, acolytes, communion servers, members of all choirs/singing groups, musicians, ushers, Sunday school teachers, and FROG leaders. 4) Mask wearing by congregation members is highly recommended. We will review these decisions at the next church council meeting in October.

We want to keep things as "normal" as possible, but we feel certain modifications are appropriate at this time. We know that these decisions will not be popular with everyone. Some people will say that we are not doing enough. Some people will say that we are overreacting and doing too much. There is so much uncertainty when it comes to COVID. Who is vaccinated and who is not? Who has the antibodies and who does not? What about the freedom to choose? What about looking out for your neighbor? It can be very challenging to balance all of this. None of us have been trained to handle some of these situations. We simply try to do the best we can with the information that we have.

We pray for your grace and understanding for both the council and the pastors as we continue to navigate the unknown. These are challenging times for a lot of people. Let us not forget our mission at First Lutheran: "Receiving God's Grace. Sharing God's Love. Uniting in Christ."

Hello from Council,

I don't know. I wonder how many times this has been my response to a question the past 18 months. WORSHIP THEMES

October 3, 2021

TIME AFTER PENTECOST

PSALM 8; HEBREWS 1:1-4; 2:5-12; MARK 10:2-16

Today's gospel combines a saying that makes many of us uncomfortable with a story we find comforting. Jesus' saying on divorce is another of his rejections of human legislation in favor of the original intent of God's law. Jesus' rebuke of the disciples who are finding off the children should challenge us as well. What does it mean to receive the kingdom of God as a child does?

October 10, 2021

TIME AFTER PENTECOST

AMOS 5:6-7, 10-15; PSALM 90:12-17; HEBREWS 4:12-16; MARK 10:17-31

The rich man who comes to ask Jesus what he should do to inherit eternal life is a good man, sincere in his asking. Mark's gospel is alone in saying that Jesus looked on him and loved him. Out of love, not as judgment, Jesus offers him an open door to life; sell all you own and give it to the poor. Our culture bombards us with the message that we will find life by consuming. Our assemblies counter this message with the invitation to find life by divesting for the sake of the other.

October 17, 2021

TIME AFTER PENTECOST

PSALM 91:9-16; HEBREWS 5:1-10; MARK 10:35-45

Today's gospel starts with disciples obsessing over who will be closest to Jesus, leading Jesus teaching his followers about God's take on importance and power. Here Jesus makes it explicit that the reversal of values in God's community is a direct challenge to the values of the dominant culture, where wielding power over others is what makes you great. When we pay "your kingdom come" we are praying for an end to tyranny and oppression. We pray this gathered around the cross, a sign of great shame transformed to be the sign of great honor and service.

October 24, 2021 TIME AFTER PENTECOST

JEREMIAH 31:7-9; PSALM 126; HEBREWS 7:23-28; MARK 10:46-52

Can we pray the way Bartimaeus prays? People try to hush him up because by addressing Jesus as the "Son of David" he is making a politically dangerous claim that Jesus is the rightful king. Could our prayers ever be heard as a threat to unjust powers that be? Bartimaeus won't give up or go away quietly, but repeats his call for help more loudly. Do we ask so boldly? And are our prayers an honest answer to Jesus' question, "What do you want me to do for you?"

October 31, 2021 REFORMATION DAY

JEREMIAH 31:31-34; PSALM 46; ROMANS 3:19-28; JOHN 8:31-36

Rooted in the past and growing into the future, the church must always be reformed in order to live out the love of Christ in an ever-charging world. We celebrate the good news of God's grace, that Jesus Christ sets us free every day to do this life-transforming work. Trusting in the freedom given to us in baptism, we pray for the church, that Christians will unite more fully in worship and mission.


our mental health is affected in these strange days of ongoing pandemic, decision fatigue, division, and brokenness swirling around.
