Birthday Destinations

A few years ago around my birthday, I was asked the question: "Where was the most interesting place you ever spent your birthday?" At the time, I didn't give it too much thought and probably responded, "Wherever I am on my birthday." Lately, I have given that question a bit more thought. I have spent the majority of my birthdays wherever I was living in the United States. Not unusual. Probably so have most of you. Hence, I have spent birthdays in Minnesota, Illinois, Michigan, Virginia, Pennsylvania, and Nebraska. I have come to realize that I have also spent a number of my birthdays outside the United States. The reason for this is simple; while I was teaching at the Lutheran Seminary in Gettysburg, January was global travel month. Since my birthday is in January and since I escorted students on a number of those January trips, I have spent my birthday in various foreign locations such as Rome and Mexico City.

I have also spent three of my birthdays in Canakkale, Turkey. You have probably never heard of Canakkale, but it is an important city in Turkey with a population of over 325,000. Canakkale sits at the southern entrance to the Dardanelles which is the major waterway leading from the Mediterranean Sea through Istanbul to the Black Sea. Canakkale also sits at the western edge of the continent of Asia. If you take a 20-minute ferry to the other side of the Dardanelles, you will find yourself on the eastern edge of the continent of Europe. The site of the famed ancient city of Troy is about 20 miles from Canakkale. In fact, the Trojan horse that was used in the 2004 film "Troy" is on display in Canakkale.

I have also spent four of my birthdays in Tiberius, Israel which is a large city on the Sea of Galilee. On one of those birthdays, our tour group spent the day driving all across northern Galilee, and that is when I was able to view Mount Hermon. You might wonder what is so interesting about that. Mount Hermon sits right where the borders of Israel, Syria, and Lebanon come together. It is over 9,000 feet high and is one of the highest mountains in the Middle East. The snow-melt from Mount Hermon helps form the headwaters of the Jordan River which flows all the way down to the Dead Sea. The view of snow-covered Mount Hermon totally dominants the landscape of northern Israel. But there is a catch to viewing Mount Hermon. For most days in a given year, Mount Hermon is completely shrouded in clouds formed by warm air coming off the Mediterranean Sea which hits the cold elevated air surrounding the mountain. In fact, while I have been to Israel six times, I have only seen Mount Hermon on three separate days. But that birthday, it was absolutely clear and visible for over 70 miles away. Psalm 133 even uses the dominance of Mount Hermon to celebrate the unity of God's people:

1 How very good and pleasant it is when kindred live together in unity!

2 It is like the precious oil on the head, running down upon the beard, on the beard of Aaron, running down over the collar of his robes.

3 It is like the dew of Hermon, which falls on the mountains of Zion. For there the Lord ordained his blessing, life forevermore.

So, what is the most interesting place you have ever spent your birthday? Pastor Rick


THURSDAY EVENING MEALS

The Election of a New Bishop for the Nebraska Synod

On November 22, Bishop Maas announced that he will be leaving the office of Bishop to take a new call as Vice President for Mission and Spiritual Care at Immanuel Vision Foundation, one of Nebraska Synod's Serving Arms ministries. His call as Bishop will end on August 31, 2022.

At the next Nebraska Synod Assembly (June 2-4, 2022 in Kearney), there will be an election for a new Bishop to serve a six-year term. First Lutheran will have eight delegates at this Assembly (our three pastors and five lay delegates to be elected by the Congregation Council). In advance of the Synod Assembly, each Conference of the Nebraska Synod will gather on February 5th for a meeting to nominate potential candidates for the Office of Bishop. The delegates who attend this advanced nominating meeting are to be the same delegates who attend the June Synod Assembly. At its January 2022 meeting, our Congregation Council will be electing the lay delegates from First Lutheran so that they are able to attend both the advance Nominating Meeting and the Synod Assembly.




