Lenten Abundance

"You don't have to give up something for Lent?" I remember being asked that question more than once when I was growing up. The town of my youth (which was almost the exact same size as Kearney) was predominantly Roman Catholic in terms of religious affiliation as were my elementary school classmates (and though I attended public schools the large number of Roman Catholic students meant fish was always on the Friday cafeteria menu). Consequently, it was not unusual for religious topics, especially those related to the differences between Roman Catholics and Protestants, to find their way into our conversations at recess. "Why would I have to give something up for Lent?" I would ask my classmate inquisitor. "Because those are rules for Lent. You've got to give up something. Didn't your priest tell you the rules?" To which I would respond, "We don't have a priest. We have a pastor."

Don't get me wrong. My Methodist family did observe Lent. We attended church on Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, and (usually) Good Friday. We had Lenten folders in which we would put a dime in a sleeve every day for 40 days. During my days in Junior High, if basketball practice got done in time, I would go to Wednesday evening Lenten services before I went to Confirmation class (usually under duress). It is just that we didn't give something up for Lent. I do appreciate people who have a tradition different from mine and who practice giving something up for Lent as a spiritual discipline and a mindful commitment to the season of Lent. I just would not put that under the category of something one has to do because those are the rules for Lent.

For our Wednesday evening mid-week services this Lent, we are actually going to go in a bit of a different direction. We are going to focus on abundance (something not always done in Lent); the abundance of God's faithfulness, mercy, compassion, forgiveness, and love. We will incorporate a key scriptural passage and a central visual image along with readings, song, silence, and prayer to help us focus on the multitude of God's gifts which abound in our lives. So, whether or not you have a tradition of giving something up for Lent, we hope you can join us for a Lenten journey on the path of divine abundance. A Message from the Co-Lead Pastors

Mission Outreach Lenten Offering

People often ask what item is most commonly requested through Care Portal, a technology platform designed to connected children and families in crisis to churches and people who want to help. Across the 20 U.S. states that Care Portal is active in, and within Buffalo County, the answer is clear: beds and cribs.

Reasons for needing a bed vary, but some include: poverty, escape from circumstances without the ability to bring belongings, insect infestation, or unexpected addition of a family member. Sometimes, providing a bed for each family member is a requirement for children to be reunified with parents, or for a family member to care for a child, so they are not placed with others.

So, the Mission Outreach Team of First Lutheran Church has designated this as the Lenten Project for this year. There are different ways that you can help:

- **Donate** to the collection boxes located at the Welcome Stations in the narthex.
- Volunteer to build basic beds that are ready to meet those requests.
- Volunteer to deliver a bed to a family in need.
- **Pray** for families in need, and for the staff at agencies that serve them.

March 6, 2022 FIRST SUNDAY IN LENT

DEUTERONOMY 26:1-11; PSALM 91:1-2, 9-16; ROMANS 10:8B-13; LUKE 4:1-13

On a recent Zoom call with my Region 4 Campus Ministry colleagues, we were asked:

What do you think... is the Church in a Noah's ark situation right now?

This question came up because there seem to be waves rising all around us; a swelling panic that the Church won't survive in this almost-post-pandemic world. After all, attendance is down and giving is down and pastors are exhausted and people aren't getting what they want from the Church anyway. Young adults seem to find community elsewhere, along with folks of all ages.

When we really think about it, the story of Noah's ark is actually pretty confusing and terrifying. Perhaps that's why we like to focus on the cute animals walking two-by-two to distract us from the fact that most everything on earth is destroyed in that flood.

But. Noah's ark is the kind of story in which awful things happen and God's promise remains: *something will survive, something will last – even when it feels like all hope is lost.*

The Church has survived the rise and fall of so much... the comings and goings of individual leaders, waning attendance, education programs, the introduction of new liturgy and hymns, and even our individual demands for what "church" should be...

The Church survives because the Church is God's.

Together, we live in a death/resurrection story because of Jesus, and now seems like a really crucial time to ask – what needs to survive to keep the Church moving ahead for the sake of the Good News? Is it programs? Is it a certain number of worship services or precise number of people in the pews? Is it masking policies or aligned political perspectives? Is it whom and how we love? Is it about individual needs and wants, or the whole?

What survives? There are so many questions. And a singular invitation.... God's invitation.

Perhaps God's invitation is to be in holy conversation about what we want to put on the ark - together.

The Church is God and God will have God's way – but that doesn't mean we can't dream alongside the Creator about who and what the Church is and can be for the sake of the Good News of Jesus Christ.

So much in our culture is changing. How do we authentically honor what was, what new things need to surface, and what will last into the future? How can we enter into this holy work *together*?

Perhaps, we need to pause in assuming that one person or one group has the answer. Let's start asking each other honest questions, and listen well to one another and to God.



NOTES FROM THE PRESCHOOL: A MINISTRY OF FLC

Hello First Lutheran Families,

We can smell spring coming even if the groundhog disagrees! Our 3- and 4-yearolds have been busy making hearts for Valentine's Day and we have been learning about the anatomical heart along with other body parts. We have a resident skeleton in our classroom that has taught us about some cool anatomy, and we even played with a working heart model.

Another subject we touched on this month was measuring.
