Spring, Holy Week, Passover

When I was growing up in Minnesota, there seemed to be annual occurrences which were marks that Spring was near. For example, when the Dairy Queen reopened after being closed for the winter months (it was an outdoor, walk-up Dairy Queen) we knew that Spring was not too far off. When the gutters overflowed with water due to the snow melt, Spring was coming. Another sign that Spring was near was the Minnesota State Basketball Tournament. Back in those days there were no divisions according to the size of schools. It was simply the eight teams that won their respective regions. That meant there were true Cinderella teams such as Hayfield, a town with a population under 1,000, taking on teams from affluent suburbs around the Twin Cities (think *Hoosiers*). Another sure sign of Spring's imminent arrival was outdoor baseball practice. The temperature might be hovering around 35 and piles of snow might still linger under the bleachers, but we were out there. The basic attire included sweatpants with gym shorts worn on the outside, zip-up hoodies over stocking caps, and during batting practice at least twice your hands would really sting when your bat made contact with the ball. Yet, we knew Spring was on the way bringing much warmer baseball weather. Of course, there was always Holy Week and its varied worship services. More than once there were snow storms on those days, but I don't think church services were ever cancelled on those important days. In my home congregation, Maundy Thursday was one of three times a year the Lord's Supper was offered so you didn't want to miss that service. (Although, when I was in seventh grade, I had my tonsils out on Maundy Thursday; I didn't make it to church.)

Now that we have lived in Nebraska for a few years, I've noted certain signs indicating that Spring is near. The migrating of the Sandhill Cranes, for example, is a clear sign of Spring's approach. During this time of year, we see robins house hunting for choice nesting sites in our backyard. It also seems that the wind blows even harder than usual as Spring approaches. When I put the snowblower in the shed and retrieve the lawnmower, Spring must be drawing near. And, of course there are the services of Holy Week just as when I was growing up.

Unlike Christmas, which is a fixed date, the dates of Holy Week vary from year to year. You may have wondered why this is the case. It all has to do with the first full moon after the first day of Spring. While this may initially sound a bit strange, it goes back to the time of Jesus. Jesus' last supper and his crucifixion occurred at the time of Passover. The first Jewish Passover at the time of Moses (over 1,200 years before Jesus) occurred on the 15th day of the month of Nisan in the Hebrew calendar which was a full moon. Almost every year since then, this is the first full moon after the vernal equinox which marks the beginning of Spring. So almost every year, Holy Week occurs the same week as Passover. Theologically, there are also a number of connections between the meaning of Passover and the meaning of Jesus' death. Passover involved the death of a lamb, and the New Testament understands Jesus to be the lamb of God whose death takes away the sin of the world. The blood of the Passover lamb was spread on the doorposts of Hebrew houses whereas we refer to the new covenant in Jesus' blood. The food of the Passover meal is very specific (lamb, unleavened bread, and bitter herbs) as is the food of the Lord's Supper stemming from the Last Supper (bread and wine). The annual Passover meal involves remembering how God liberated the Hebrew people from their slavery in Egypt. The Lord's Supper is carried out in remembrance of how God liberated us from our bondage to sin through Jesus' death. At the Passover meal, the story of the original Passover is retold. When we celebrate the Lord's Supper we retell the story of Jesus' death for us. That Holy Week is a sign of the arrival Spring is rooted in the ways in which Passover and Holy Week have been intertwined calendar-wise and theologically since the time of Jesus' death and resurrection.

Mission Outreach Lenten Offering

People often ask what item is most commonly requested through Care Portal, a technology platform designed to connected children and families in crisis to churches and people who want to help. Across the 20 U.S. states that Care Portal is active in, and within Buffalo County, the answer is clear: beds and cribs.

Reasons for needing a bed vary, but some include: poverty, escape from circumstances without the ability to bring belongings, insect infestation, or unexpected addition of a family member. Sometimes, providing a bed for each family member is a requirement for children to be reunified with parents, or for a family member to care for a child, so they are not placed with others.

So, the Mission Outreach Team of First Lutheran Church has designated this as the Lenten Project for this year. There are different ways that you can help:

- **Donate** to the collection boxes located at the Welcome Stations in the narthex.
- **Volunteer** to build basic beds that are ready to meet those requests.
- **Volunteer** to deliver a bed to a family in need.
- **Pray** for families in need, and for the staff at agencies that serve them.

APRIL 3, 2022 FIFTH SUNDAY IN LENT


PSALM 126; PHILIPPIANS 3:4B-14; JOHN 12:1-8

April 10, 2022 PALM/PASSION SUNDAY

A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR ELISABETH



Dear First Lutheran,

My favorite movie right now is definitely Disney's "Encanto." If you haven't watched it yet, the movie tells the story of a magical family, the Madrigals, who live in a magical house called Encanto. Each child in Encanto goes through a "gift ceremony" in which their magical door opens magical gifts and abilities unique to each receiver – super strength, perfect hearing, healing others, understanding animals – and every child has received a magical gift except for Mirabel.

As Mirabel begins to see the magic of Encanto is in danger, she decides that even though she doesn't have a magical gift bestowed on her, she will bring the family together to save the Encanto. It turns out we are not only defined by a single gift.

The story, images, and most of all the great music appeal to all ages. While I was watching, I texted my pastor friends from seminary, "have you seen Encanto? There's a sermon in here somewhere..." and the response was "let's write a Bible study!" So, we're working on one and maybe we'll be able to implement it this summer. But, in the meantime, the movie is a great conversation starter to talk about faith. Thanks to the Nebraska Synod "Staff Pick of the Month" which also highlighted this movie, I've included the questions below so you can talk about faith on the big (or living room) screen!

- We don't know why some family members have magical doors and gifts while others don't. What are some of the emotions we see because of the gifts? Are they all 'good' emotions?
- Mirabel doesn't have a magical door, but she does have gifts! What are some of Mirabel's gifts? How does this connect with the Priesthood of All Believers in 1 Peter 2:4-5?
 - As you come to him, the living Stone—rejected by humans but chosen by God and precious to him— you also, like living stones, are being built into a spiritual house to be a holy priesthood, offering spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. (1 Peter 2:4-5)
- Let's talk about Bruno! Bruno's gift can sometimes feel like a curse, and he doesn't always know how to use it. It wasn't until he reconnected with his family that he saw the beauty in his gift. What spiritual gifts do you have that feel difficult, like a curse? Who can you connect with to help nurture and grow your gift?



Handel's "Messiah"


