Bishops

I first encountered bishops in fifth grade, but my initial experience with bishops was not in church. It was in my elementary school, or after school to be more exact. My fifth-grade teacher, Mr. Dowler, loved to play chess. One winter day he announced that he would teach anyone in our class how to play chess if they were interested. The next week about a half dozen of us started staying after school to learn all about chess. Mr. Dowler started by teaching us the chess pieces, their alignment on the chess board, and how they could (or couldn't) move. So I first learned that bishops were those chess pieces that had a round top with a little knob on them, and they could only move diagonally across the chess board. Only later did I learn that the bishop in chess actually represents the medieval church.

Bishops have been part of the Christian church since New Testament times. The Greek word for bishop (which is *episkopos*) appears five times in the New Testament. In 1 Peter 2:25, Christ is called an *episkopos* while in Acts 20:28; Philippians 1:1; 1 Timothy 3:2; and Titus 1:7 the word is used to refer to human members of the church. The Greek word itself means "overseer" and would refer to someone who exercise oversight and protect care. Early Christians adopted this term (as well as the term "elder") to apply to leaders in a given congregation who provided some level of oversight or care for its members though we do not know the specifics of their responsibilities or even how they came to be appointed as "bishops." It also seems that in New Testament times congregations had more than one bishop, possibly indicating that different bishops had different leadership responsibilities in a given congregation.

By the early second century, bishops were elected leaders of Christian congregations though some congregations had multiple bishops while elsewhere there was one bishop overseeing the ministry in a single city. By the end of the second century, however, it seems that the office of bishop evolved so that one bishop exercised oversight over a broader area. Why the shift? During this time, semi-Christian sects started to arise which claimed to have secret knowledge about God and Christ not found in the New Testament or the traditional teaching of the church. To combat such sects, the church turned to key leaders both to defend and to represent the widely held, orthodox beliefs and teachings of Christianity.

In the fourth through eighth centuries, councils of hundreds of bishops were convened by Roman emperors to debate and settle matters of theological differences and debates between various Christian groups. The most famous of these was the first such council, the Council of Nicaea from which came the Nicaean Creed which we still confess today. Thus, in many ways during these years, bishops were not only important leaders in the church, but they were the major theologians of the church. By the end of this period, the two major bishops overseeing Christianity were the Bishop of Constantinople (who was the Patriarch of the churches in the eastern empire) and the Bishop of Rome (who was the Pope overseeing churches in the western empire and according to their tradition there existed a continuous succession of popes which stretched all the way back to the Apostle Peter).

In medieval times, bishops came to hold political as well as religious power, and an issue of contention involved who appointed bishops: the Pope or a given king? As a result, the later Lutheran reformers declared that the office of bishop was strictly an ecclesiastical office and that bishops were not to exercise or interfere with secular authorities.

In the ELCA, each of the sixty-five synods of our church has a bishop elect by a synod assembly. All the bishops are pastors of the church who both carry out and oversee the pastoral duties of preaching the gospel and administering the sacraments. Likewise, our bishops provide pastoral care and leadership for the synod and its rostered ministers. A primary responsibility is to exercise our church's power to ordain approved candidate for the office of Word and Sacrament (pastors) and the office of Word and Service (deacons). The bishop also oversees and administers the work of their synod. As of September 1, 33 of the ELCA bishops are women and 32 are men. In addition to our synodical bishops, the ELCA has a presiding bishop who provides leadership for the life and witness of our denomination.

The office of bishop has a long and distinguished (though at times also tarnished) history in the church of Jesus Christ. In June, Reverend Scott Johnson was elected to serve as the next bishop of the Nebraska Synod. He will be installed as our synod's bishop at a worship service to held here at First Lutheran Church in Kearney on Saturday September 24 at 1:00 p.m. To host the installation service of our new bishop is quite an honor for our congregation, and we are quite excited about the service and most excited about our partnership in ministry with Bishop Johnson.

COUNCIL UPDATE

Org Chart Review and a Potential New Ministry Team

Greetings First Lutheran Congregation,

Here's a brief report of the latest happenings from council. We agreed to be a charter organization for a potential new Venture Scout program. We also decided to form a special task force to review the church staff organizational chart. It's a healthy practice to review the org chart for future planning/needs of the church. A review of the org chart hasn't occurred in the last 5 or 6 years. We have an excellent staff of people who often go above-and-beyond for the church. It's important that we continue to set them up for success and adjust job responsibilities as the needs of the church evolve over time. This will be a joint effort between Council and Personnel Team.

We also discussed our Ministry Teams and the wonderful work being done by volunteers of the church. One need that has been discussed for a while is the need to be more visible in the community. As a result, we will be introducing a temporary committee that could grow into a permanent Ministry Team known as "Community Connections Team."

Additionally, it will create content for digital media (web and social) and marketing use that will grow our reach, tell our story, and invite others to join us for worship. This committee will shine a light on the ministry of the church so that others may see our good works and glorify God. We will be looking for volunteers to fill this committee in the coming weeks. Look for more information coming soon. We are excited about the potential that a committee like this could bring to the table.

Additionally, we heard reports about preschool, children's programming, and First Lutheran Youth group. As we enter the new academic calendar, we pray that God be with the kids, teachers, parents and others involved. May God help us all learn and grow in our faith.

TIME AFTER PENTECOST


AMOS 8:4-7; PSALM 113; 1 TIMOTHY 2:1-7; LUKE 16:1-13

FLY – First Lutheran Youth: Summer Mission Trip Reflections

When I started the trip, I didn't know what to expect. I didn't know how amazing the people would be and certainly not the impact it would have on me as a person. But as we left on the first day, I could see we were all very excited to be going. Our first activity happened to take place 40 feet in the air on the high ropes course at Camp Carol Joy Holling, and it happened to be way worse than it seems. It was our first real test to see how well we would handle each other in trying circumstances because while some of us can talk quite a bit when you get up there it all changes. We also spent time working much closer to the ground on the low ropes course and going through team-building exercises.

We had a pretty quiet day 2 meeting new people and getting to watch the royals win 4-2 over the Rays. In the process of learning about everyone else we also learned a lot about the people, we traveled with. One person we learned a lot about that night was Keith who was only allowed to sleep in our room for one night due to the snoring that kept some of us up. But after a long night, we got up for our third day of the trip but our first day of service projects. I had the privilege to get to work with Project Cure, a medical distribution group that gives medical supplies to places around the world, but only after they have been asked, which means Project Cure won't send supplies or show up where they aren't invited. I personally packaged up bed frames for Ukraine, and others sorted medical supplies.

But the cool thing with their warehouse in Kansas City was that it's located underground. We then finished up our night with an escape room once again getting better at working together as a team and getting out of our room with hardly any time left. Getting up on day four we all had slept much better than the previous night (thanks, Keith) but it was once again a service day. We loaded up the van and headed to Kansas to work at the Police Athletic League. While there, we tended to their garden and participated in some boxing. We ate supper out at a lake after going swimming and then went back home to have some time to really focus together. We had a conversation about God, and sat in silence.

You could hear tears from some but still, no one said a word. For people that may not have been all too close before leaving you could tell none of that mattered. Even when I sat down with Reed, we both knew we didn't have to say a word but both knew we were there for each other. Even looking back at it now it still amazes me how a group that talks that much was quiet for that long. Even I surprised myself with that. But of course, the trip did have to come to an end but that doesn't mean we had to go out not having fun as we spent the last day at Worlds of Fun going on rollercoasters. But after we rode most of the rides we ran out of time and had to go home. This part took more work than it should have as well as we found out the church bus had broken down but we made it back right on time regardless, thanks to a few parents who drove to Omaha to pick us up. At the end of the day, this has been one of the most eye-opening trips I have been on.

NOTES FROM THE PRESCHOOL: A MINISTRY OF FLC

Hello First Lutheran Parishioners,
